




The Burren Storehouse Presents....

In a time in which our lives are increasingly tamed, monitored, controlled and urbanised, our words and our stories are in danger of going the same way. For the 2018 Burren Connection Exhibition, Burren College of Art is pleased to host *Early Marks*. The Burren Connection series highlights art which takes inspiration from the unique environment of the Burren and its relation to global ecological concerns.

Early Marks is a study of the beginnings of art, and possible source of, a prehistoric worldwide visual language through large-scale paintings and sculptures by UK/Ireland artist, **Keith Payne.** For many years, Payne worked in the entertainment industry which enabled him to travel the world and pursue his interest in prehistoric art.



About Early Marks

The language of 'Early Marks' consists of imagery, symbols and patterns that have been left in the physical world but created in the 'other world'.

A Geno-graphic Map of human migration out of Africa acts as a guide to locating the places in the world relevant to the images displayed. There is no Time associated with any of the works, as Time is a construct invented long after the images on exhibition. Hunter- Gatherers, the makers of Early Marks, lived in a visionary state now lost to western civilization.



Euphoria!! The new Burren Beer......

Celebration of EUPHORIA from the Burren Brewery

27 October 2018, 6pm

On the Saturday of the October bank holiday, a new beer will officially be launched in the Burren Storehouse. It is called EUPHORIA, and well-known beerista Sorcha Hamilton from the Irish Times as well as wine and food critic Leslie Williams from the Irish Examiner will be giving talks.

Euphoria is a unique beer made without the help of hops. Master brewer Peter Curtin went out into the Burren, and collected wild yeast from the air which was then magically combined with six different herbs gathered by herbalist Lisa Guinan. "The Happy Beer" got its name from the mildly euphoric effect it can have on those who drink it.

The launch will celebrate the wonderful combination of Burren's nature, its wild components and man's ingenuity in using those ingredients to turn them into something else.

Aillwee bear was living alongside first Irish settlers

In 1976, hundreds of animal bones were discovered in Aillwee Cave when it was first developed as a tourist site. Botanist Brian Ottway of University College Galway collected these bones and carried out a basic study of the remains. He identified over 20 bear bones from the cave, including a bear skull. Since then, bear has become the iconic symbol of Aillwee Cave, and the most famous bear in Ireland!

In 2018, a project directed by Dr Marion Dowd of IT Sligo, sought to reanalyse the 453 animal bones that survived and date some of the remains. Dr Ruth Carden of UCD analysed the animal bones. Sheila Hamilton-Dyer examined the bird bones.

It was believed that only one bear was represented in the remains from Aillwee Cave but radiocarbon dating carried out by the Chrono Centre at Queen's University Belfast revealed the presence of two ancient bears from Aillwee Cave.

The bear skull from Aillwee has been radiocarbon dated to the Early Mesolithic and is 10,400 years old. The population of Ireland at this time was quite low, with probably fewer than 1,000 people in the entire country. These groups would have been nomadic hunter gatherers who did not live in permanent settlements but moved around the landscape during the year following food resources. Wild pig, salmon, eel and hazelnuts formed an important component of their diet. The Mesolithic bear from Aillwee indicates that the Burren was forested at this time as brown bear could not have survived in the exposed limestone Burren that we know today. This bear was male and a sub-adult (1.5-5 years old). He may have been using the cave as a den, or for hibernation, and died there. A bear bone from Glencurran Cave in the Burren National Park, approximately 7km from Aillwee, has also been radiocarbon dated to the Early Mesolithic and is 9,000 years old – making the Aillwee bear older by 1,400 years.

A bear tibia (leg bone) from Aillwee has been radiocarbon dated to the Late Neolithic and is just over 4,600 years old. This bone came from an adult bear and has a chop-mark that suggests the bear carcass was butchered by humans. It was during

the Neolithic that megalithic monuments such as Newgrange passage tomb were built. Poulnabrone portal tomb, just down the road from Aillwee Cave, was also constructed during the Neolithic but is almost a thousand years older that the Aillwee bear. However, Poulnabrone would have still been a focus for religious rituals when the Neolithic Aillwee bear roamed the surrounding forests.

Aillwee bear continues...

A horse tooth from Aillwee has been dated to the Iron Age and is 2,100 years old. In total, seven horse teeth came from the cave but no other horse bones. By the Iron Age the landscape of the Burren would have looked similar to nowadays, with little forestry remaining and much of the karst geology exposed. There is very little evidence of Iron Age people in the Burren, though an Iron Age bridle bit was found near Corofin. Horse fittings are common Iron Age finds around Ireland and testify to the importance of horse for farming, transport and warfare. Throughout Iron Age Europe, the horse acted as a symbol of status, wealth and prestige. Horses were also sometimes included with human burials or buried in their own right. Horses at this time were much smaller than modern horses, and would have been about the size of a Shetland pony. The Iron Age Aillwee horse was presumably owned by someone who lived in the locality, but how the teeth entered the cave is not known.

In more recent centuries, part of the cave served as a fox den. Many of the animal bones represent prey eaten in the cave, as evidenced by carnivore gnawing on the bones. Partial remains of 11 lambs and goat kids, 1 sheep, 4 rabbits, 5 hares, 2 chickens, 2 domestic geese and 4 domestic ducks were recovered. It appears that in several cases only parts of these prey animals were brought back to the cave. Radiocarbon dates suggest fox occupation potentially between 1660 the 1970s.

Though this collection of animal bones is largely natural in origin, there is some evidence of human archaeological activity in and around the cave. One hare bone of unknown date was burnt and may represent the remains of meal preparation and consumption near the cave. The only pig bone from the site had been sawn at both ends with a metal hand saw. This bone was dated to approximately 250 years ago and likely derived from a local farmhouse sometime between 1490 and 1810. Like the hare bone, the pig bone may have been brought into the cave by a fox.

Irish Hospitality at it's Best!

In June 2018, seventeen members of the Lally and Masse clan from the United States stepped into the Roadside Tavern for refreshments. Now, Ireland is well known for its warm hospitality and a natural curiosity for the people passing through. But what this group didn't expect was the special kind of hospitality they received from the owner himself, Peter Curtin.

Peter Curtin is not only the third generation owner of the Roadside Tavern, the master brewer of the Burren Brewery under the same roof as the Tavern, and an inventor. He is also a fountain of knowledge. Must be all the smoked salmon they smoke next door in the Burren Smokehouse!

So when the members of the Lally and Masse clan stepped into the Roadside Tavern, they also entered a kind of history hub. Peter and the visitors got talking, and it did not take long for them to discover thanks to Peter, that they might have a famous cousin – athlete and Olympian Sonia O'Sullivan no less! After their visit, one of the Masse family contacted her management company hoping that he can connect strands of the family history that are a bit sketchy.

Speaking of strands, it turned out that the Lally and Masse clan have connections to Lisdoonvarna through their ancestors called STRAND who used to have a Temperance Bar in Tivoli Terrace, Church Street.

Peter drew the connection and put them in contact with the current resident of that very same house who showed them the historical photo from the Lawrence Collection, taken in 1908.

It seems that the musical roots and talent of today's clan members stem from Lisdoonvarna. Among others it must have been Cathy Strand playing the accordion at the time, who must have passed on the musical genes to her descendants.

So this is what can happen when you step into a pub in Ireland, and especially into the Roadside Tavern in Lisdoonvarna – you might get more than just food and drink!
